WHO ARE WE?

School Counselors are certified/licensed educators and mental health professionals. School Counselors must hold, at minimum, a master's degree in school counseling, meet the state certification/licensure standards, fulfill continuing education requirements, and uphold ASCA ethical and professional standards.

ACADEMIC

Your counselor can help you schedule your classes, help set educational goals, and develop a four-year plan.



POST-SECONDARY

Your counselor can help you create a plan for after graduation, help with college applications, and provide information and resources for scholarships and financial aid.

SOCIAL/EMOTIONAL

Your counselor can provide individual and group counseling, connect you with outside resources, and help you learn strategies and techniques to use throughout your life.



CONFIDENTIALITY

Students, we want you to know that the counseling office is a safe space; whatever you say with your counselor STAYS in their office.

HOWEVER, there are exceptions:

If you are at risk of harming yourself, harming someone else, or someone is harming you, we have to alert parents/guardians and/or the proper authorities.

About Knowledge in Action

AP U.S. GOVERNMENT AND POLITICS

The five projects in the AP U.S. Government and Politics KIA course are organized around the overarching question, "What is the proper role of government in a democracy?" Each project involves simulations in which students take on roles that help them experience, in a hands-on way, the content required by the College Board AP course framework. For example, in one lesson, students act as delegates to the Constitutional Convention and have to decide whether to ratify the new Constitution. In another, they organize and execute a presidential campaign.



AP ENVIRONMENTAL SCIENCE

The AP Environmental Science course contains five projects organized around the question, "How can we live more sustainably?" In one project, students calculate their ecological footprints and investigate the impacts of their families' consumption habits. In another, they act as farmers who design a farm with ecological and economic constraints in mind. The projects highlight civic engagement, progressing from personal explorations of the content to a focus on global issues such as climate change, and they fulfill the same content requirements as the traditional AP Environmental Science course.

Students in 2D Art classes will study in depth the traditional artistic tools and technical processes of painting and drawing, as well as less conventional 2D media projects. The forms seen in past student work and historical examples of art will serve as the framework for understanding the expected outcomes of the course(s). Contemporary images and pictorial modes of communication may also be covered in these classes.



Students in 3D Art classes study and create projects with attention to the technical processes of ceramics and jewelry. Courses focus on the tools and methods of hand-built ceramics, soldered, riveted, and cast jewelry. Creating designs, spatial context, depth, texture, mass, and volume will also be addressed.



Students in Digital Art classes create photography, commercial art and graphic design projects while learning the technical processes associated with those media. Courses will focus on the tools and methods necessary in creating original photography, edited photos, graphic design(s) and illustrations. Students will apply spatial context, contrast, value, repetition, alignment, proximity, depth, harmony, unity and layout and design.

All members are required to do a minimum of 40 volunteer hours, 20 each semester.

At most 10 hours of community service can be earned one event.. These hours can be completed for a non-profit organization unless approved by the Advisors.

Whole group projects are mandatory events. Adopt a family car drive is a mandatory event for ALL members. Other mandatory events include the canned food drive, Special Olympics and our induction ceremony.

MEMBERSHIP REQUIREMENTS

Members must embody the four pillars of NHS: Character, Leadership, Scholarship, Service.

CHARACTER:

The set of qualities that defines an individual as unique from everyone else

Students of good character are courteous and respectful, abide by moral conduct, work well with their peers, and display honesty.

LEADERSHIP:

The ability for one to have influence over and guide a group of people

Students who demonstrate leadership are reliable, skillfully handle problems, cooperate with and help others, and serve as role models in their community.

SCHOLARSHIP:

Knowledge accumulated from learning Through research and study

Students of scholarship have a minimum cumulative GPA of 3.5 and consistently take on challenges in their academic courses.

SERVICE:

Work providing assistance to others without desires of compensation or reward

Students of service voluntarily help the community with their hearts, expressing a positive and earnest passions for volunteering and making the world a better place

MEETINGS

Members are required to attend all meeting.

Meetings are usually the first and third Monday after school in Room 212.

Members who miss two meetings will be put on probation for the semester. A third missed meeting in the same semester results in removal from NHS. Members on probation will not be eligible for honor cords at graduation.
